Annual Report: 2018

1.0 SUMMARY OF MAJOR ACTIVITIES

At Bloemfontein Campus 2018 began with a launch of a successful Library Orientation Week. The library orientation run over an extended period between January and March. In the library orientation programme organised in the first quarter of 2017 the library was only able to attract **609** First Years students. However, in the first quarter of 2018 this number swelled to **1,342**. Thus, the number of First Year Students who attended the 2018 Library Orientation rose by over 100% in comparison to the previous year. This was the first time in many years that the library was able to draw such a large number of students. The table below shows the attendance by faculty.

The relative success of the 2018 library orientation was attributed to a strategy employed by the library. Unlike in the previous years where the library relied on the institutional induction schedule and reactively expected students to pitch up as programmed the LIS Client Service took a more proactive approach. They liaised with the relevant faculty members (Faculty Administrators) to ensure that specific dates suitable to relevant faculties were found, assigned (and communicated to students) for library orientation. Perhaps the idea of extending the orientation programme period also helped to pull students in large numbers. At Welkom Campus, the orientation programme took place from 06th to 09th February and on 12 February 2018. Welkom Campus also recorded an increase in attendance. In the First Semester of 2018, 652 students attended in comparison with 528 students who attended in the First Semester of 2017.

In the same vein, a Library Training Workshop for New Staff Members was organised in the 1st Quarter of 2018. A total of 10 academic staff members mainly from the Faculty of Humanities attended the training. A similar Library Training Workshop was scheduled for August 2018. However, on this occasion the training only attracted 3 academic staff members.

The CUT library joined the South African library fraternity to commemorate the South African Library Week which run from 19 – 25 March 2018 under the auspice of the Library and Information Association of South Africa (LIASA). The theme of the National Library Week of 2018 was *Libraries: Heart of the Community*. In conformity with the national theme, the CUT library opted to celebrate the event by reaching out to the broader community. In this respect, the library, in partnership with the CUT Reading Club, visited the Bloemfontein Children's Sunflower Hospice on 22 March 2018. The hospice is a non-profit organisation that provides care and compassion for children with life-threatening and life-limiting conditions. CUT library staff distributed reading materials, puzzles and toys solicited from Van Schaik Book sellers. Furthermore, the Library staff bought fruits and snacks to cheer up the children as a gesture of compassion. Students from the CUT Reading Club also organised a story telling session, a puppet show and assisted children with colouring of storybooks. The occasion turned out to be heart-warming. What was even more fulfilling was that the visit was well-appreciated and provided insights into challenges encountered by the hospice. The CUT library and the Reading club members pledged to volunteer their services to the hospice in future in the hope to uplift their spirits of these children.

The CUT library also commemorated the World Book & Copyright Day. This day is observed annually on 23 April in many parts of the world, under the auspices of UNESCO, to promote reading, publishing and copyright.

In line with the commitment of the LIS to work collaboratively with other units in the Division of Research, Innovation and Engagement the LIS teamed up with Community Engagement, CUT Schools Advancement Academy and the CUT Reading Club to organised a high impact event.

In the main, the event centred around 60 Grade 10 Learners invited from St Bernard's High School in Bloemfontein for a Reading Buffet. The purpose of the Reading Buffet was to encourage reading, allow creativity, enable ideas and knowledge to be shared across learners, and strengthen mutual understanding and dialogue.

The Reading Buffet was proceeded by a launch of the World Book and Copyright Day held in the Art Gallery. Professor A Ngowi, DVC: Research, Innovation and Engagement, officially launched the event. Also invited were Ms Z Gxwati: Director of Libraries, Free State Department of Education who presented introductory remarks for the event. Other activities organised for the learners included poetry, storytelling, colour coding and comedy.

The excitement, thrill and active participation of learners and their teachers, in the event, was apparent and most probably an indictment of the success of the event.

WORLD BOOK AND COPYRIGHT DAY CELEBRATED AT CUT

In addition to organising a Reading Buffet, the LIS donated books to learners at Bainsvlei Combined School to foster a reading culture and promote CUT as a university of choice among School Leavers.

One of the major activities accomplished in the Third Quarter of 2018 was the first phase of the library review. It commenced in August 2018 and was completed in September 2018. The main purpose of the review was to assess key services provided by the library with a view to recommend interventions

that could help to shape the future direction of library services in alignment with the strategic objectives of the Central University of Technology (CUT) mindful of the 21st Century technological developments. It was anticipated that the Fourth Industrial Revolution could have far-reaching implications for library services. In this regard, it was hoped that the library review would give general guidance to reconfigure library services and facilities to embrace the benefits associated with the Fourth Industrial Revolution.

Three components constituted the library review as follows: The LibQUAL survey, external assessors and benchmarking visits. The LibQUAL survey is an online tool developed by the American Association of Research Libraries. The LibQUAL tool covers a wide range of foci however, for the purpose of the CUT library survey the tool focused on perceptions of CUT library clients, library spaces, use of technology, and services offered by library staff. External assessors drew information from the results of the LibQUAL survey and information gathered in interviews and discussions with library staff, academics and students. External assessors were also afforded an opportunity to tour the library to gain more insights into services and facilities provided. In a quest to augment the contents of the library review, two senior library staff members were requested to visit a select number of libraries in some traditional universities to broaden the scope of the library review and learn from their experiences.

On 17 September 2018, the CUT Library successfully completed the migration from an older library system to a newer one (Millennium to Sierra). The latter system was more versatile and user-friendly than the older system whose enhancements had been curtailed by the proprietors (Innovative Interface Inc.). Migrating from one library system to another was no easy task. Numerous hiccups and glitches many of which were beyond the control of the library plagued the process. On hindsight, it took four years to navigate to a new library system. From the onset, the library opted to join a consortium of university libraries, based in the Eastern Cape, in a bid to migrate to Sierra. Nevertheless, when the CUT management could not render support to a proposal to join the consortium the library tried to solicit funds to secure two servers. This was a prerequisite to migrate to Sierra. However, the high costs of servers, notwithstanding the need for technical support to maintain Sierra, was yet another bottleneck in this long and, at times, turbulent voyage which started in 2014. For this reason, the library management made a decision to settle for a cloud solution to migrate to Sierra. However, latency was such a huge challenge partly due to the fact that Sierra was hosted overseas in Ireland. Following several consultations with the service providers it was decided, in 2017, to host Sierra in South Africa to overcome the latency defy that made it almost impossible to access or work on Sierra. After initial delays and challenges to find, a suitable hosting company the service provider finally signed a contract with Dimension Data (a Johannesburg base firm) as a hosting company. This development concluded the migration process and made the CUT Library as the first library to operate on a Sierra cloud solution hosted in South African.

The weeding project started earlier in the year and continued well into the Fourth Quarter. The essence of the project was to identify and dispose redundant materials and create space for newly acquired library print study materials. The exercise also offered an opportunity to identify and remove study materials that were in a state of disrepair from library shelves. Among the library, material removed from the library shelves included those that were over twenty years old but had never been issued out to anybody, materials in excessive duplicates and those that were torn beyond repair. Credit should be given to WIL students who provided assistance in this labour intensive project. The assistance of WIL students was extended to another project intended to upload the old examination papers of 2017 and 2018 to be available online on the library system.

The LIS needs to acknowledge the contributions of Ms Jean Engelbrecht who was recruited as a Librarian: Cataloguing, on a temporary basis, to provide assistance in the weeding project. Ms Engelbrecht was assigned the responsibility to write off weeded materials and updated holdings. Her meticulous work culture ensured that materials removed from the collection, by mistake, were identified and taken back to the library shelves.

2.0 TRAINING PROGRAMMES

The LIS places high premium on affording opportunities for LIS staff to acquire new skills and get exposure to different and innovative ways of doing things in this fast evolving information profession.

5.0 CATALOGUING

This is a more intense professionally function which requires adherence to set international standards. In general, it covers assigning of metadata (bibliographic description) representing information resources and allocating library shelf location (classification number). Nevertheless, in an academic library environment it is an ongoing activity of updating bibliographic records. Table 20 below suggests that more cataloguing activities were performed in 2018 as opposed to 2017.

6.0 SYSTEMS

6.1 Databases

The amount of money allocated to databases limited the capacity of the library to broaden the scope of databases subscribed to in 2018. As such, the subscription status remained generally unchanged to 2017 serves for one additional database added to the suite.
