

POSTGRADUATE WELCOMING WEBINAR





The Research Development and Postgraduate Studies: Graduate School invites you to attend a virtual welcoming webinar for postgraduate students.

Presentations will cover a variety of topics including: The value of research: impact and relevancy | Is your research a potential breakthrough? | Are we on the right track? | The role of LIS in enabling research | It's complicated! | Introduction of Honors Mentoring Programme | RD & PGS: What we offer in 2022

The Research Development and Postgraduate Studies: Graduate School hosted a virtual welcoming webinar for postgraduate students on Thursday, 17 March 2022. The webinar was based on the theme:

A world without research: Are we on the right track?



Presentations covered a variety of topics including the value of research: impact and relevancy, is your research a potential breakthrough, are we on the right track, and the role of LIS in enabling research, it's complicated, but there is a road to simplicity. The webinar also focused on the way forward pertaining to what the Research Office will offer in their 2022 programme. Sixty-nine (69) postgraduate students and staff attended the webinar.



SEMINAR ON DOCTORAL VIVAS

The aim of this seminar was to learn more about the approach to the doctoral oral examination, debate our institutional practices, and map a way forward in the introduction of the VIVA as part of the doctoral examination at CUT. The target audience was faculty deans, assistant deans, doctoral supervisors, and doctoral students with fifty-nine (59) participants in attendance. Prof Samson Mashele did the welcoming and introduction.

Prof Eli Bitzer presented the background on the development and the (international) use of doctoral oral examinations, the potential advantages and disadvantages of the viva, the purposes and uses of doctoral vivas, and the roles and responsibilities related to doctoral vivas.

Participants and role players debated whether doctorate vivas should be mandatory at CUT. The acting Senior Director: RD & PGS: Ms Edith Sempe presented a suggested framework which was followed by input from stakeholders on the draft operational plans and timelines for incorporating doctoral vivas (oral examinations) into the CUT doctoral examination regime.

The faculty deans strongly supported the concept, and more discussions will be held to map the way forward.



The doctoral oral examination or 'viva vocé' ('viva' for short) as it is also called, is widely used internationally and by some research universities in South Africa. One of its main purposes is to authenticate the research.

There are specific roles and responsibilities that accompany doctoral vivas, which need to be clear and adhered to by all parties involved. Learn more about the how, what, when, where and why at the seminar.



SUPERVISION WEBINAR SERIES



SUPERVISORS: WEBINAR SERIES FOCUSED ON DEVELOPMENT OPPORTUNITIES

The RD & PGS: Graduate School is organising a **series** of four (4) developmental opportunities for thirty (30) newcomer research supervisors to address the bigger picture of supervision, supervision practices, assessment, and other important tasks of supervisors. The facilitator is Prof Eli Bitzer from the Centre for Higher and Adult Education at Stellenbosch University.

The webinars will be presented via the Zoom platform on Wednesdays from 14:00 – 16:00.

Webinar 1: The 'bigger picture of supervision' - 4 May 2022

Webinar 2: Supervisor skills - 18 May 2022

Webinar 3: Evaluating and examining senior degree work –8 June 2022

Webinar 4: 'Other' important supervisory tasks, including project management – 6 July 2022

Attendees at the supervision webinars debate on important matters such as:

- national and international trends that dominate research and practices related to senior degree supervision.
- opportunities and challenges in co-supervision.
- how can students be assisted with their research proposals?
- how can research students be helped to build sound argumentation in a thesis?
- how can students' literature reviews and developing a conceptual framework be promoted?
- how can students be guided toward sound research methodology decisions?
- how can supervisors provide constructive feedback on the work students submit?
- why is the examining of senior degree work so important?
- how do we account for the differences between master's and doctoral studies in examining?
- what do we examine and what criteria are applicable?
- how can supervisors assist their students to self-evaluate a study before submission for examination?
- how can supervisors ensure that competent and non-biased examiners are nominated and appointed?
- what managerial roles and skills are expected of research supervisors?
- when and how should supervisors intervene at critical stages of a research study?
- what happens to graduates after graduation and do supervisors have any role to play?
- how can supervisors assist their students and graduates to disseminate their research to wider audiences/interest groups?



WRITING RETREAT FOR DOCTORAL STUDENTS





The Graduate School hosted an online writing retreat from 1 to 3 June for 25 doctoral students from various disciplines.

The retreat consisted of 3 live sessions each day. Participants worked on their draft articles and submit them to the facilitators for immediate feedback. At the end of the retreat, most participants had completed a draft article or had written up a substantial part of their papers on which the facilitators provided feedback.

All delegates received free online access to the 4th edition of Dr Cassim's *Postgraduate Toolkit*.

EVALUATION OF THE WRITING RETREAT

The retreat was evaluated through an online questionnaire. All participants reported that the retreat achieved its objectives and that the course content and delivery method were relevant to their needs. All participants rated the performance of the facilitators as excellent.

A FEW TIPS FROM THE RETREAT

An abstract should contain the following sections, written concisely:

Introduction to the research problem, leading to the clear articulation of your research question, aims, and objectives; a short description of your research design and methodology; your main research findings; the significance of your research, which makes the reader aware of how your research contributes to expanding body of knowledge in your research area. Important so that, as a reviewer, I know why we need to publish your paper. We could have published a similar paper in the past – what is different about your paper?





WRITING PROGRAMME THEMES IN THE 2ND SEMESTER

A SERIES ON THE NATURE OF SCIENTIFIC KNOWLEDGE REPRODUCTION AND THESIS WRITING

Sessions 1 & 2

Introduction to the basic principles of thesis writing and argumentation

Topics include - basic claims of academic research, types of knowledge contributions, elements of an argument, the value of constructive alignment in thesis argumentation, and building self-assessment criteria for successful theses.


Session 3

Theory and theorising, particularising, drawing conclusions from data

Topics include Introduction to philosophical assumptions, Introduction to theory and constituents of theory, choosing theory for your study, reading and getting to know the theory, and engaging with theory and theorizing at PhD level.

Session 4 Writing tips and tactics for emerging scientists

Looks at a variety of practical principles for academic writing; from structuring principles, tactics for developing student writing, how to assess research papers, getting published, to ways to establish yourself as a disciplinary expert in your field.



Session 5

Doing research in cross-cultural contexts: Learning from ethnographies

This workshop helps the scientist – emerging ethnographers in particular – prepare for and succeed within cross-cultural research situations.

Session 6

Doing qualitative interviews: using Hermeneutics and Qualitative data analysis

The workshop will include both principles for doing qualitative research and case studies of how to deal with qualitative data and different ways.

Session 7: Principles for conducting Critical Research

Postgraduate students and emerging supervisors may find this workshop useful to help them negotiate challenging research contexts and to develop their skills in critical reflexivity.





