LIBRARY AND INFORMATION SERVICES Annual Report: 2016

1.0 SUMMARY OF MAJOR ACTIVITIES

The renovation of the larger 24-hours Study Hall continued in earnest upon the opening of the First Quarter of 2016. This labour intensive activity involved removal of old carpets which were disfigured and dilapidated in many patches. New carpets known to be more durable and easier to clean were installed. Other activities involved painting of the walls and repairing and replacement of power points and computer networks. New study furniture was also acquired to replace old ones. By the end of the Second Quarter the renovations were completed and the facility was open for students' use.

The January orientation of First Year Students was held on 14, 15 and 18th at Bloemfontein Campus and 8th-12th at Welkom Campus. Additional orientation days were set aside at Bloemfontein Campus to include 28th January and 11th February to accommodate students who were unable to attend the induction on the designated dates for one reason or the other. As usual the library orientation focused on introducing students to library services with particular emphasis on how to access library resources, locating of various library services and expected code of conduct of library clients in the library. Records shows that 746 and 542 students attended the events at Bloemfontein and Welkom Campuses respectively. In 2015 Bloemfontein Campus attracted 890 students while Welkom Campus recorded attendance of 723 students. This means that in 2016 the number of students who attended the orientation programme declined at Bloemfontein Campus and significantly increased at Welkom Campus.

The South African Library Week (SALW) was commemorated from 14th -18th of March. This is an annual event celebrated worldwide. In South Africa the SALW is symbolic of a celebration of the intellectual and literary heritage of the country. Several events were lined up at Bloemfontein Campus. The official launch was held on 14th of March. The Deputy Vice-Chancellor: Teaching and Learning, Professor D. Ngidi, represented the Vice-Chancellor and Principal as the guest of honour. Other events organised in the week included a workshop on "Proposal and research writing" targeted at current and prospective masters and doctoral students, a movie on the impact of libraries in changing people's lives titled "Gifted hands: the Ben Carson Story", a "Keep your Library Clean campaign" and a student's competition on CUT Library Services which was designed to encourage students to join the CUT Book Club.

The World Book & Copyright Day was used as an opportunity to celebrate the CUT Book Writers on 12th May 2016 at Bloemfontein Campus. This event dedicated to sharing of CUT writer's experiences was launched by Prof. D. Ngidi, DVC: Teaching & Learning. Guest Speakers were Ms I. van Tonder and Mr L. Molapisi from DALRO (Copyright for Dramatic, Artistic, Visual and Literary Arts in South

Africa) who delivered an informative presentation on the more recent trends on Copyright and Intellectual Property (IP) in South Africa. They also touched on the Blanket and Transactional copyright licenses that they provided. A select number of CUT academic staff who produced scholarly works such as books and chapters, in edited books, were invited to give presentations. Among them were Prof. S. Matoti and Prof. D. Kokt. Representing the CUT Reading Club was Ms B. Lenong. Also invited to speak was Mr Lechesa a public community writer. In the recent past Mr Lechesa wrote a book titled: "Essays on Free State Black literature". In his book Mr Lechesa outlines a breath-taking literary revolution that had taken place in the Free State province. Prof. L. Lategan gave a vote of thanks. The number of attendees was 56.

At Welkom Campus library Dr S. Makola was invited on the day of commemorating the World Book and Copyright Day to share with the audience insights about a book he had just published. The title of the book was; 'Find meaning and stop wondering'. The event was held on 28th April 2016, in the library hall, and was attended by both staff and students.

In keeping with the library policy to embrace digitalisation, in the second quarter, 1,857 examinations question papers of June 2015, for both Bloemfontein and Welkom Campus, were digitized and uploaded on the Student portal in time for the May-June 2016 Assessment. On the other hand CUT publications namely: *The Interim* and *The Journal for New Generation Sciences*, were also uploaded on the CUT Institutional Repository.

In collaboration with IComTec the Library was able to setup and configure the EZProxy system for operation. This computer device is very useful in improving access to electronic library resources. This is particularly important considering that the library had made a strategic decision to redirect more investments in digital resources as opposed to print resources. Each database that the CUT library subscribes to has its own unique login protocol (Password) which serves as a form of authentication. EZProxy uses the CUT authentication to allow CUT clients access to databases the LIS subscribes to using CUT credential (normal login procedures). As such it is no longer necessary for CUT library clients to remember or use different passwords provided by service providers to access CUT databases.

As part of the commemoration the Mandela Day's 67 Minutes of service the library organised an event to plant a seed of collaboration between the Central University of Technology and Tsholetsang Primary School located in the Rocklands of Bloemfontein. At this event, held on 22nd July 2016, the then Deputy Vice Chancellor: Research, Innovation and Engagements Professor H. De Jager officially opened a school library established with material and manpower support from the Central University of Technology. The project was mooted in 2014 when the school administration approached the CUT library for assistance to set up a school library. Among the material assistance provided were office furniture, book support shelves, computers and reading materials (elementary school reading materials). Most reading materials were sourced through generous donations from CUT Library book

suppliers namely; Van Schaik, Book etc and Sherwood. In a gesture to express gratitude and appreciation the Deputy Principal of the school, Mr S. Mokhele had this to say at the official opening of the library: "We had no library and lacked books. We also had reading periods but they were not used to read in most cases, due to having very few books...the library (CUT) has granted us an opportunity to bring pupils from their classes to utilize those periods and read in the library".

In November drinking water fountains were installed in the library for library clients. Two were installed on level 1 and one on level 2.. With these facilities students are able to drink water whenever necessary within the library building. This will also help to discourage students to enter the library building with liquid bottles.

The Third Quarter marked the end of one chapter in the history of library services. The CUT Kimberley Campus site Library, which was located in the public library, was closed on 3th November 2016. This followed the discontinuity of Faculty of Management teaching programme in Kimberley. A total number of 310 books were packed and returned from the Kimberley Public Library to the main Library in Bloemfontein.

On a personal note Ms L. Malefane took up a permanent appointment at CUT Library as Junior Librarian: Inter-Library Loans with effect from March 2016. Previously she served at the University of Cape Town. Ms M Mollo was also appointed as Temporary Junior Librarian: Short-Loans (Evening Duty) for the period July 2016 – Nov 2016. In a related development Ms Z. Mokone was appointed as Deputy University Librarian. To this effect she took up leadership of the Technical Services at the CUT Library. Previously she was employed as Librarian: Cataloguing in the same section. Last but not the least Mr E. Zungu was appointed as Faculty Librarian: Faculty of Engineering and Information Technology in the Third Quarter. In the same period Ms S. Lesetja was appointed as Librarian: Faculty of Health and Environmental Sciences. She was recruited from the University of Venda. On the other hand Mr T. Jobo took up early retirement. Mr Jobo was employed as Faculty Librarian (Faculty of Engineering and Information Technology). In the similar vein Ms J. Molopyane left CUT to take a management appointment at Free State University library. Prior to her departure Ms Molopyane was employed as Faculty Librarian (Faculty Health and Environmental Sciences).

At Welkom Campus: Mr J Seeli was appointed as a Senior Library Assistant with effect from 01st July 2016. On the other hand two staff members bid farewell to CUT. Mr L. Maphiri resigned employment at the end of February 2016. Towards the end of 2016 Ms Y. Jacobs retired after working for the CUT for 23 years.

Meanwhile at a ceremony held in the Art Galley long service awards were awarded to the following LIS Staff members: E. Matlho (25 years), D. Ackerman (25 years) and Z. Mokone (20 years) at the close of the 2016 academic year.

2.0 TRAINING PROGRAMMES

The LIS places high premium on affording opportunities for LIS staff to acquire new skills and get exposure to different and innovative ways of doing things in this fast evolving information profession.

3.0 INFORMATION SERVICES

Throughout the year the library provided information services to staff and students. Information services were offered in different format ranging from providing basic skills in information searching (mostly for undergraduates) to conducting in-depth and complex information searches on behalf of students and staff (mostly for post graduates and academics).

In the year under review there was a significant increase in the number of students trained (PIM). In year 2015 a total number of students who attended PIM was 6,161. However in 2016 this number increased to 8,702. However there was a marked drop in the number of customised information services offered to postgraduate students as will be seen in tables 8 and 9 while there was a slight increase in the number of Undergraduate quick reference queries.

It should be noted that unintended and unforeseen consequences of adopting PIM as a compulsory subject emerged. The sheer large number of students is increasingly becoming overwhelming to the extent that Faculty Librarians are struggling to cope with the teaching instructional load. It is apparent that unless some solution is found the workload challenge will soon be unsurmountable and create a great risk to continuity of the programme in its current format.

3.3 Interlibrary loans

Interlibrary loan services are intended to supplement the library effort to meet information needs of clients. This service is provided under an agreement between university libraries in South Africa to borrow materials, from each other, that they may not have in their individual collections. This service is provided exclusively to postgraduate students and staff.

The drastic increase in interlibrary loan transactions recorded in 2016, in comparison to 2015, seems unrealistic. A close scrutiny of this set of data is warranted in 2017 more so that the current trend in most academic libraries is that, by and large, fewer interlibrary loans placements are being experienced in virtually all universities. This is largely due to the mushrooming of alternative sources of information in electronic format. The general propensity towards use of electronic databases, Institutional Repositories and the growing number of open access study materials have substantially driven out the appetite for use of interlibrary loans services.

3.0 ACQUISITIONS

The year 2016 was very challenging in a number of respects. The funding for library resources was under severe strain. Besides underfunding the library budget was approved very late in course of the academic year. It would appear that the tightening of institutional financial controls coupled with students' inability or reluctance to meet hiked university fees had a huge toil on university finances in general and the library resourcing in particular. Naturally this development had a negative impact on acquisition of library information sources.

However for the current reporting period the library budget cuts cannot be reflected in statistical format because the library adopted a new model for recording of acquisitions data which makes is it unrealistic to compare the library materials acquired in 2016 to 2015. Perhaps the section covering cataloguing materials would be more explicitly to demonstrate the advert effects of budget cuts on library resourcing. The Acquisitions tables will only show the impact of budget constraint in the quarterly and annual report of the 2017 academic year.

5.0 CATALOGUING

More often than not there is a symbiotic relationship between acquired library materials and processed library materials. Library materials processed are normally derived from materials acquired or purchased in a given period. More than anything else table 18 below is a clear testimony of the impact of library budget cuts. The drastic decline in materials processed, especially library material catalogued in 2016 as opposed to 2015, essentially depicts the extent to which underfunding of library resources undermined the library ability to acquire study materials.

6.0 SYSTEMS

6.1 Databases

Subscription to databases is important in supporting teaching and learning and building the research capacity of the university. The budget for subscription to databases was equally affected by underfunding of library resources however a strong case for allocation of additional funds was made given that most subscriptions to databases were based on long term contracts that the university had already committed to. As such towards the end of the academic year the Finance Office of CUT was compelled to secure funding from other sources to meet the library contractual obligations for database subscriptions.

6.2 Use of databases

In the past many academic libraries considered databases as supplementary study/research materials to print library resources. Nevertheless, in recent years databases are seen as critical to academic endeavour. As a matter of fact use of databases has surpassed printed study materials as the main source of research literature. Today in many academic libraries use of databases or electronic resources is more popular for study or research purposes than use of printed books or printed journals.

Incomplete as the table on use of databases might be it is quite clear that use of databases is paramount in the academic projects at CUT. Almost 2.5 million searchers were recorded in 2016 and 57,589 full-text downloads made by library clients. Paradoxically while more downloads were made in 2016 in comparison to 2015 there was a decrease in the number of searches made on databases. It could be argued though that downloads are more important as they proximate actual usage of databases

6.3 Electronic books

In 2013 the LIS took a decision to embrace and acquire electronic books as a strategy to broaden the base of library resources. To this effect subscription to ebooks commenced in 2014. Henceforth the library had been providing comparative statistics on use of ebooks from year to year. It suffices to mention that in 2015 EbscoHost eBook collections were added to the table along with ScienceDirect ebook subscriptions.

It was encouraging to see that in 2016 the number of searches and full-text downloads on EBSCO eBook platform was significant greater that that recorded in the previous year. Similarly in the year under review they were more full-text downloads made on ScienceDirect than was the case in 2015. This improvement in the pattern of usage gives the library management a sense that there is value for money in investing in electronic resources. However there is still need to attract even more clients to use electronic books.

6.4 CUT Institutional Repository (IR)

Unlike eBooks whose usage is restricted to bona fide CUT clients (registered students, CUT staff and its affiliates) use of the CUT Institutional Repository is available for use online in South Africa and elsewhere. Presently the platform is still very much in its infancy. Only is limited proportion of CUT scholarly works have been uploaded thus far. As more materials are uploaded we are likely to see a greater volumes of usage than recorded in recent times.

7.0 CIRCULATION SERVICES

While online access to library resources continued to surge circulation of printed materials seemed to be losing grounds. This trend, which has been observed in a couple of years now, is not necessarily a reflection of the paucity or dwindling quality of library materials. Most probably this is indicative of availability of more alternative sources of academic literature especially in electronic format. It could also be a demonstration of the success of library training activities in accessing online information sources.
