During this hands-on workshop, Mr Gerben van Niekerk, a well-known radio personality with a vast background in communication, broadcasting and media, helped postgraduate students to develop practical tools that will assist them to engage confidently with public audiences. He focused on the basic skills, as well as the tools and tactics required for effective public engagement. Participants received hands-on training in communication, focusing on how to present their research to a non-expert audience in a formal setting. This workshop aimed to help participants to make their presentations more compelling, passionate and engaging in preparing for the Institutional Three-Minute Thesis Competition.

3 Minute Thesis Competition

On the 4th of October 2019 the Institutional Three-Minute Thesis (3-MT) Competition showcased fourteen entries from Master's and Doctoral students across all faculties.

The 3MT Competition is a global competition in which Master's and Doctoral students have just three minutes to present their research topic to a non-specialist audience. To be successful, they must communicate the importance, relevance, and impact of their research to an audience in jargon-free language, using only one slide. The 3MT competition is an opportunity to develop skills for communicating research ideas in ways that are precise, concise, engaging, and accessible to a broad audience. It is also an excellent opportunity to demonstrate their skills in public speaking. The institutional Doctoral winner and runner up become eligible for representation at the National 3MT Competition, hosted by the University of the Free State.

The Prize Winners

All three winners are from the Faculty of Management Sciences.

PhD Prize Winner

Bianca de Klerk won the PhD category for her presentation titled *"Platteland hospitality owners: muppets or Buffets?"*. She will represent CUT in the National 3MT Competition at the University of the Free State.

The people's choice award (the audience vote for who they thought gave the most convincing 3MT presentation), was awarded to Nkosana Tshisa from the Welkom campus for his presentation on *"Black gay managers at work"*.



The Graduate School presents a series of "Boost your Academic Writing Skills" sessions particularly aimed at Doctoral students in various fields of study. The objective of these 2-hour sessions over the course of 2 months is to enable doctoral students to effectively improve their academic writing skills. We cover aspects of the writing process, coherence and cohesion, style, the literature review, problem statements and hypotheses, paragraphing, paraphrasing, refencing techniques, academic integrity and other skills essential in academic writing.
